

Does your ED have a PECC?

Pediatric emergency care coordinators (PECCs) are essential to improving outcomes for children in emergencies.

What is a PECC?

PECCs are pediatric champions who help ensure emergency departments (EDs) are "Pediatric Ready" by coordinating adherence to national guidelines on pediatric emergency care.¹

Why is the role important?

The presence of PECCs in the ED is tied to significant increases in Pediatric Readiness.² High levels of Pediatric Readiness in EDs are associated with up to 76% lower mortality risk in children.³

What does the PECC role involve?

- EDs should have both a nurse and physician PECC.
- For EDs with limited resources, multiple individuals can share PECC duties or an advanced practice provider (APP) may help to support the role.
- Pediatric expertise is not required. You simply need a passion for pediatric care.
- Individuals do not need to be solely dedicated to the PECC role and can have other responsibilities.
- Ideally, PECCs have a set job description, support from administration, and protected time.

All EDs should have both nurse and physician PECCs.

What does a PECC do?

PECCs help ensure Pediatric Readiness across seven areas of focus. Example responsibilities include:

- Establishing and maintaining pediatric-specific policies and protocols, such as always obtaining a full set of pediatric vital signs
- Ensuring staff maintain pediatric competencies through resources, education, and/or simulation
- Tracking pediatric equipment and supplies and orienting staff to where they are located and how to use them
- Collaborating with the ED quality team to include pediatric measures in the quality improvement plan
- Maintaining a relationship with your state Emergency Medical Services for Children Program



You can become a PECC
